The NGC Flower Show Awards numbers were just changed and now the VFGC numbers have been revised to reflect the new system. Note there are several new award categories and that two previous categories, Home Standard Flower Show and Standard Flower Show Staged in a Public Building, no longer have their own awards, but may still be held and entered into another category. These new Flower Show Award numbers should be used on any books of evidence submitted in 2018 and going forward.

Single Club Flower Shows: letters A, B, C, and D correspond to club size

A is fewer than 21 members (i)

B is 21 – 49 (ii)

C is 50 -99 (iii)

D is 100 or more (iv)

Multiple Club Shows: letters A, B, & C correspond to number of clubs sponsoring the show

A is one club

B is two or more clubs.

C is for (1) Youth Participation in Standard Flower Shows (NGC # FS-17C) and (2) A Specialty Flower Show sponsored by a Council, District, State or Regional organization.

<u>Gordon W. Chappell, FASLA</u>: Gordon Chappell has taught at Landscape Design School for many years in several states. From Georgia, Gordon is a graduate of the University of Georgia, a former garden director at Colonial Williamsburg, and a Fellow in the American Society of Landscape Architecture. His private practice of landscape architecture in James City County focuses primarily on historic properties.

<u>Jack Douglas, ASLA</u>: Jack is the President and Founder of Douglas Associates, a professional landscape design and architecture firm in Richmond, VA. He taught as an instructor for the University of Richmond, Georgetown University and the University of Virginia. His garden designs have been featured in *Southern Living* and *Southern Accents*. Jack received a bachelor's degree in Landscape Architecture from the University of Georgia and a master's degree in Landscape Architecture from Harvard University.

<u>Trevor R. Buckley, Landscape Planner</u>: Trevor is a landscape planner and designer with a keen interest in bringing ecological design principles to bear on projects at all scales. His education and research have taken him across the American West, Europe, and Southeast Asia. Not so fast with the fall clean-up! As you put your flower gardens to bed this fall, leave some flowers behind to provide food and shelter for birds. The seed heads of black-eyed Susans, purple coneflowers, goldenrod, sunflowers, asters, zinnias, and other flowers are important food

sources for birds in the winter. The remaining plant material from flowers and grasses provide shelter as windbreaks, nest materials, and temporary cover. While these flower left-overs may not offer the same color and charm as your spring and summer flower garden, they do provide helpful wildlife habitat, and a great opportunity for wildlife viewing from the comfort of your easy chair.

Town and Country GC recently completed a beautification project of a butterfly garden and National Monarch Way Station in conjunction with the Junior Garden Club. This garden, located on the campus of the Wise County Christian School, contains a raised flower bed flanked by several smaller raised beds. Only

chemical free, organic products were used in this garden, making this National Monarch Way Station an organic butterfly garden. With the help of many other hands within the community, we were able to use this project as a butterfly/pollinator education program.

The goals that will be achieved as a result of this garden will include helping to protect the butterfly population, demonstrating the role that butterflies play in pollinating flowering plants, and emphasizing the role of the butterfly in



pollinating many human food sources. It is hoped that this garden will enlighten community members on the plight of the butterfly with 5 species having gone extinct since 1950 and an additional 25 species listed as endangered and will assist in butterfly and pollinator preservation, conservation, and improvement. The garden will provide many happy hours for the

butterflies, the local population, and the school children.

Plants in the garden include annual, biennial, and perennial nectar species. Among these plants are *Lantana*, *Nasturtiums*, *Zinnias*, *Cosmos*, *Marigolds*, *Tithonia* (also known as Mexican Sunflowers), and dill. Perennials we can plant are Purple Coneflowers, *Aster*, Catnip, Daisies, *Coreopsis*, *Monarda* or Bee Balm, *Sedum*, *Yarrow*, *Phlox*, *Liatris* and Milkweed.
