Tony Todesco, founder and owner of Stow Florist/One Main Street Studio, of Stow, Massachusetts, has designed and commented for trade shows and has appeared on television promoting the use and enjoyment of flowers. He is a regular guest designer, lecturer and instructor for Civic, Design Groups, and Garden Clubs on state, national, and intern ational levels. Design programs have been presented to numerous museums, including The Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, and The Minneapolis Institute of Art. Tony's large scale designs are a regular exhibit at the Museum of Fine Arts.



Among his many accomplishments are set design and staging for numerous flowers shows, including The Massachusetts Horticultural Societies' Annual New England Flower Show. He is proud to be a National Garden Clubs (*NGC*) Master Flower Show Judge, and served on the NGC Flower Show Committee as New Design Development Chair (2001-2009). He developed and introduced five new design types which are included in the NGC Handbook for Flower Shows, and are also seen in the Designing by Types publication. Tony is now Design Consultant for the NGC Flower Show Schools Committee.

In addition to over 35 years in the Metro West Boston area, Tony's colorful style and expertise make him a sought after designer, lecturer, and commentator. Because of his creative use of plant material in his designs and technical knowledge, he not only interprets design trends, but helps create

them.

Ellen Ogden is the co-founder of The Cook's Garden seed catalog and author of numerous books including The Complete Kitchen Garden. Her articles and designs have appeared in Martha Stewart Living, Horticulture, and Eating Well magazines as well as the New York Times and The Boston Globe. She has been a guest on PBS's Victory Garden and the Baroness of Basil on HGTV. As an award-winning food and garden writer, Ellen is known for her informative and fun-

loving garden talks and design workshops. Her designs combine artistic elements with classic garden design techniques which elevate a backyard vegetable garden into a European-inspired kitchen garden.

Jef Naunchik is a 1986 graduate of Virginia Tech with degrees in

horticultural landscape design and studio art. He is a landscape designer with Village Garden Center, Fishersville, VA, where he designs and installs elaborate gardens, water gardens, gazebos, patios and decks. His landscapes have been published in Southern Living, Southern Accent, and English Gardener magazines. Jef teaches at Blue Ridge Community College, and Valley Career and Technical Center. "Planting Today for Future Generations"

Whew! What a whirlwind and exciting fall with the garden clubs in our state. I'm now receiving and enjoying reading the Club Presidents' Reports and I can say Virginia Garden Clubs are alive and flourishing and accomplishing wonderful works.

I was a guest at all six district meetings. Each district meeting was well planned with delightful and unique programs and all were well attended. Vendors were kept busy: plants, mechanics, boutique items, floral designs, silent auction baskets, and white elephant sale items were all being carried in the arms of eager gardeners who love to shop at district meetings because they can't find some of these items elsewhere.

I was privileged to attend milestone celebrations of several garden clubs: Natural Bridge celebrated 85 years and was able to celebrate in the home where the garden club was organized, Herring Hall; Town and Country Garden Club of Wise celebrated 60 years with three charter members in attendance; and Kilmarnock celebrated 50 years on September 19 at the beautiful and historic Tides Inn. All of these clubs are very active.

On Veterans Day, November 11, Blue Star Memorials were dedicated in Charlottesville by the Monticello Garden Club and in Big Stone Gap by the Big Stone Gap Garden Club. I was able to attend the moving dedication in Big Stone

Gap but had to miss the Charlottesville dedication since I couldn't attend both.

During the 2015-2017 VFGC Administration, President Janice Clem promoted the Living Legacy Project which commemorates soldiers who fought in the civil war, many who died on the battlefields within what is now designated as the Journey Through Hallowed Ground National Heritage Area. A tree will be planted or dedicated for each soldier who died along the 180-mile Byway from Gettysburg to Monticello. The planting and dedication of the first of the VFGC sponsored trees was at the entrance to Woodbury Forest School in Madison on November 7, 2017.

Virginia's grant program, "Grants to Beautify and Restore" has awarded funds to two garden clubs and a district: Chilhowie Garden Club in partnership with the Chilhowie City Council to create a Butterfly Station in the heart of town next to the City Hall; Rapid Ann for their ongoing "beauty spot" in the town of Orange; and Blue Ridge District to restore the Margaret Healey Memorial Garden at the O. Winston Link Museum and Roanoke Valley Visitor's Center adjacent to the Hotel Roanoke.

The "Keys to the Future Youth Project Grants" awarded a total of \$7,300 for projects to work with school students. Every project receiving funding helps to instill gardening knowledge that they will appreciate during their lifetime.

It's a new year and VFGC members are looking forward to two schools that will be offered this winter and spring. Flower Show School Course II will be finished by the time you receive this ODG. Landscape Design School will be held April 16 & 17 in Williamsburg, VA. Williamsburg in the spring is a beautiful place to be. Plans are still being worked on before we can offer our newest school: Gardening. More information later.

I'm looking forward to seeing everyone and renewing friendships at the SAR Convention in Covington, KY March 18-19, 2018.

The VFGC Convention will be held April 8-10 at the Westin Hotel in Richmond. Speakers include Tony Tedesco, Ellen Ogden, and Jef Naunchik. We hope you all are planning to be there. Check it out on the VFGC website - www.virginiagardenclubs.org.

The NGC National Convention, "Love Blooms in Philadelphia", will be held May 20-24, 2018. Great programs have been planned – all worth attending. In addition, some exciting tours are available: Longwood Gardens, Chanticleer, Bartram's Gardens, historic Philadelphia and some Post Convention Tours. It's getting close to that time of year again! Dues (\$5.00 per member) for the upcoming fiscal year (2018-2019) are due to Kathy Ward, VFGC Treasurer, by May 31st. On or about March 1st, club treasurers or presidents will be sent a dues request package consisting of a club roster, contact information sheet, and a new member add-form (to be used when adding new members to your roll after the initial dues payment date). If you don't receive this package/envelope around that time, please contact Kathy Ward immediately! Also, if you are no longer treasurer or president, please pass the envelope on to your new representative.

Please verify that all of your members' addresses are correct, including the nine digit zip code (available online at www.usps.gov). The treasurer passes a copy of the corrected roster to the ODG Circulation Chairman for editing the ODG mailing list. Any errors in addresses will cause the post office to deem your ODG "undeliverable" and may cause your copy to end up in the "dead letter office"

The Group Exemption 501 (c) (3) annual update has been submitted to the Internal Revenue Service. Information regarding the annual 990N filing and contact update will be emailed (or mailed) to all subordinate contacts of record on June 1st. Please remember that IF your club, council, or district is a 501 (c) (3) subordinate, you ARE obligated to file yearly reports with VFGC. That, of course, includes filing the 990N e-postcard with the IRS. Failure to file the epostcard and/or yearly reports will result in your club being withdrawn from the subordinate group.



Improved Cultivars

Raspberry derives its name from various sources - raspise, "a sweet rose-colored wine" in mid-15th century English and from rapoie, meaning "thicket" in German - an apt description by which ever one you choose.



Importance of Project.....

Raspberries are nice...and also expensive...and also weedy if you turn your back for more than a few days BUT their flavor is resplendent. In 2015 after growing raspberries for years in various locations my husband and I gave them up - to the weeds. Filled with brambles, making cultivation of any kind difficult,

these delicious fruits just weren't worth the hassle, until a few years of deprivation made us try again.

Taking into account the reason we gave them up originally - weeding amongst brambles - we researched cultivars that were described as "thornless" but they also had to be "everbearing". Thornless raspberries are self-discriptive. "Everbearing" describes a plant that bears fruit on first-year canes (primocanes) in the late summer and fall, as well as a summer crop on second-year canes (floricanes). If you are going to mess with them, why not have them yield as much as possible in a season?

After researching even further, we came upon another reason to pick the variety Joan J. (*Rubus idaeus* 'Joan J'). At the end of the spring season, this cultivar can be simply mowed down and will rebound in abundance in the fall!! The variety was first developed in 2008 and is still not widely known but we love its large red fruit which has been abundant enough that an area three feet by ten yields enough berries to make many pints of jelly. Plus 'Joan J' is self-

His education and research have taken him across the American West, Europe, and Southeast Asia. After graduating from the College of William & Mary with a B.S. in Geology, he pursued farming and gardening for several seasons. This work led him to the Conway School's graduate program in sustainable landscape planning and design, where he earned a M.S. in Ecological Design. As a member of the landscape architecture studio at Timmons Group, based in Richmond, VA, Trevor works on a wide array of public and private sector projects in MD, VA, and NC.
- * Neal Beasley, ASLA, ISA Certified Arborist: Neal is a Landscape Architect and Certified Arborist with over 25 years of experience in the fields of horticulture, arboriculture, irrigation, landscape construction and public gardening. Neal studied horticulture at N. C. State University and was formerly Manager of Horticulture at Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden. As an Arborist, he assesses trees during the site analysis to best determine protection strategies or removal. Neal is also on the team of the Timmons Group in Richmond. 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Preston Place Decorated for the Holiday Season by Salem Garden Club Member Esther Davis

For almost 200 years, Preston Place has anchored the west end of the Salem community. And this holiday season, the home now known as the White Oak Tea Tavern has been accented with arrangements of wild and long-cultivated plants. All the arrangements are artfully put together to form "a collage of elements," explains floral artist Esther Davis of Salem.

The collections of deep green Virginia pine, twisted tawny willow branches, plumes of gray-green rosemary, scarlet-edged nandina leaves, blue berries of red cedar, cones from evergreens and seed pods show up on window sills, in fireplaces and on tables in the public rooms. Garlands of running cedar frame one fireplace. The more formal banquet room has della robia arrangements of fruits and nuts similar to what might have been used in Colonial Williamsburg.



Davis knows where each leaf, flower, and tree specimen comes from. She collects many of them from the flower beds and grounds of the Tea Tavern on West Main Street which she tends as a volunteer for the Salem Historical Society. They also come from her house, and on her regular earlymorning walks on nearby Little Brushy Mountain. Photo credit for the arrangement shown here - Esther Davis.

Many of the plants re-discovered at Salem's oldest home were planted by Dr. Esther Brown, whose family willed the house to the historical society. "The fun in the garden is finding what Dr. Brown had in the garden," Davis said. "Dr. Brown had planted quite a nice native plant garden, with wild clematis, bleeding heart, salvia, ginger and Jack-in the-Pulpit," for example.

Davis used all fresh greenery on the tea tavern's tables: euonymus, holly and pink alstroemeria nestled against pine. In the windows are rosemary, redberried winterberry, Arizona cypress, English ivy, even the burnished orange wild grass known as Bluestem collected from Little Brushy mountain. Dried leaves of magnolia and Dusty Miller from Davis' garden show up, too. "My point with these arrangements is it is amazing what one can put together from items gathered around people's homes and woods," she explained.

In the past, Davis has been known for her elaborate, colorful arrangements of flowers she painstakingly dried, in some cases reconstructed, and even tinted to restore their color. She even wrote a book on the subject, "Sensational Dried Flowers," which was published by Rodale Publishing in 1999. She has been designing with plant material since moving to Salem from Washington State.

One of her favorite jobs was the year Davis was selected to design seasonal arrangements for the Virginia Governor's Mansion when Tim Kaine was in office. She has also been a featured speaker at the granddaddy of all flower shows, the Philadelphia Flower Show. This Salem GC member has talked "to a good many garden clubs in the area about floral art."

The garden is enclosed by an outer brick wall.

Our white garden is to the right of the museum's main entrance and, we believe, was originally a cut flower garden featuring white flowers with a rectangle of grass in the center. Several years ago we replaced the grass with oyster shells and added boxwood corners interspersed with lavender. The white garden is the perfect place to sit on a bench and just enjoy the day. Both gardens are open to the public and regularly maintained by our club.

Our birthday party celebration was well covered by the Westmoreland News before and during the event. We had proclamations from the town Mayor, the chairman of the Board of Supervisors, as well as a congratulatory letter from Senator Richard Stuart, whose mother was a former club member.
