

The scope of these programs may include benefits to the community, environmental awareness/education, plant-to-food connections, outdoor classroom projects, horticulture education, and the social aspects of gardening.

Note: The revised 2018 application is available as a Word document by email from Melissa Damiano. It MUST be submitted by a VFGC member Garden Club (not the school or other organization). Applicants will be emailed to verify that I received the application.

<u>Purpose</u>: The purpose of "Keys to the Future" Youth Project Grants is to provide financial support for clubs working with youth on a specific project.

<u>Program Criteria:</u> In evaluating grant applications, priority will be given to programs that emphasize one or more of these elements:

- > number of youth participating/reached
- benefits to the community
- > environmental awareness/education
- horticulture educational focus or curricular/program integration plant-to-food connections
- social aspects of gardening such as leadership development, team building, community support, or service-learning

Funding Guidelines: Grants will NOT be provided for:

- projects in which the club does not participate in some aspect
- salaries or benefits of school personnel
- field trips outside Virginia
- political action programs
- Eagle Scout projects
- capital drives and building funds
- scholarships or endowments
- lawsuits and litigation
- overhead costs
- consumable, one-time use items or give-aways, such as T-shirts, tote bags, food, admission fees, or tuition

A Weed for Your Pollinator Garden Submitted by Jane Sorensen, Horticulture Chairman

Here's a recommendation for your pollinator garden: add goldenrod (solidago). I've had

goldenrod at the back of one of my flower beds for years, because it volunteered to be there, and also because I really like the way it looks with the phlox, rudbeckia, shasta daisies, and other flowers there. It adds a graceful plume, interesting foliage texture, and a bright splash of yellow drawing your eye all the way to the back of the bed. Then, this spring I learned (from my Extension agent) that goldenrod is an important fall food source for honeybees. Now I'm delighted to know that I have been "beefing up" my local honey bees before the long winter.



Goldenrod is a weed, but one that I welcome into my garden, since it is definitely lowmaintenance, and hasn't shown itself to be invasive (not something I can say for the *rudbeckia*, which I love), and is tough and beautiful. Consider adding it to your garden.

Gordon W. Chappell: Gordon Chappell has taught at Landscape Design School for many years in several states. From Georgia, Gordon is a graduate of the University of Georgia, a former garden director at Colonial Williamsburg, and a Fellow in the American Society of Landscape Architecture. His private practice of landscape architecture in James City County focuses primarily on historic properties.

<u>Jack Douglas</u>: Jack is the President and Founder of Douglas Associates, a professional landscape design and architecture firm in Richmond, VA. He taught as an instructor for the University of Richmond, Georgetown University and the University of Virginia. His garden designs have been featured in Southern Living and Southern Accents. Jack received a bachelor's degree in Landscape Architecture from the University of Georgia and a master's degree in Landscape Architecture from Harvard University.

Trevor R. Buckley: Trevor is a landscape planner and designer with a keen interest in bringing ecological design principles to bear on projects at all scales. His education and research have taken him across the American West, Europe, and Southeast Asia. After graduating from the College of William & Mary with a B.S. in Geology, he pursued farming and gardening for several seasons. This work led him to the Conway School's graduate program in sustainable landscape planning and design, where he earned a M.S. in Ecological Design. As a member of the landscape architecture studio at Timmons Group,

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based in Richmond, VA, Trevor works on a wide array of public and private sector projects in MD, VA, and NC.

Neal Beasley: Neal is a Landscape Architect and Certified Arborist with over 25 years of experience in the fields of Horticulture, Arboriculture, Irrigation, Landscape Construction and Public Gardening. Neal studied horticulture at N. C. State University and was formerly the Manager of Horticulture at the Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden. As an Arborist, he assesses trees during the site analysis to best determine protection strategies or removal. Neal is also on the team of the Timmons Group in Richmond. Now is the time to start planning a project and putting together an application for VFGC Grants to Beautify and Restore. All of the available money was not awarded last year. So please take advantage of these VFGC funds to help with your projects.

The purpose of Grants to Beautify and Restore is to provide financial support for clubs to restore gardens that have been damaged by natural disasters within Virginia OR beautify areas within communities. Priority is given to natural disaster restoration projects.

All VFGC clubs are encouraged to apply for a one-year grant of up to \$1,000. This can be for a new or existing project. And clubs may apply for more than one grant provided the application is for a different project. If the project is on-going, a club may apply more than one time for a grant for the project. First time applicants shall receive priority over a club that has received a previous grant.

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Hilliard Park Garden Club - Habitat For Humanity Project Submitted by Jean Fender (P)

March 26, 2018, 3 of us (2 from Hilliard Park and 1 from Windsordale Garden Club) met with the new homeowner on Winston Road in Ashland to talk about landscaping the front of her new home. We decided on basic foundation plantings with the addition of some daylilies and variegated liriope. The front of the house has mostly sun although there are a couple of tall trees that may produce some shade in the summer. We drew up a landscape plan and decided on Saturday, April 28, to do the installation.

April 28 we were delighted when 34 individuals turned out to help with the installation: (9 from Hilliard Park Garden Club, 4 from Windsordale Garden Club, 7 including homeowner, her 2 children, and 4 friends, and 14 from Habitat for Humanity.) We were able to complete the installation and mulching in 3 hours.

On the left and right sides of the porch we planted 3 dwarf Buford hollies with 2 gold mops offset in front of them. We then added Stella D Oro daylilies. On the right side of the porch steps, we planted a Camellia Autumn Moon which grows upright in a columnar habit and will produce large white blooms in the fall. On each side of the cement landing below the steps, we planted variegated liriope and on the right side beside the camellia and liriope we planted some double orange daylilies.

At the curve of the mulch on each side of the front we planted more variegated liriope. On each end of the house we planted a Sky Pencil and along each side of the house we planted more double orange daylilies.

On the left side of the porch steps is latticework covering the underside of the porch. We planted 2 nandina firepowers in front of the latticework with gold daylilies in between and in front. Once the planting was done, everything was neatly mulched with black mulch to add the finishing touch.

To help disadvantaged students realize the rewards from gardening and growing plants, 73 elementary students learned about how to plant and grow the amaryllis bulb.


Salisbury Garden Club partnered with Homework Helpers, a volunteer after school tutoring program that pairs a high school student with an elementary student from the Suburban Mobile Village. Sixteen club members, many who came both days, assisted students in planting an amaryllis to take home. Thirty-six elementary students planted an amaryllis



to take home on Wednesday, January 3, and 37 more students planted Thursday, January 11. None of the elementary students knew anything about an amaryllis, and neither did most of the high school tutors.

To strengthen the students' math skills they also made predictions about the height, color, number of blooms and blooming date of their amaryllis. Later, as the amaryllis began to grow and bloom, students had the opportunity to measure and record the number and color of their blooms. Students also learned how to take care of their amaryllis when it was done blooming, so they can enjoy their amaryllis for many years. The students were amazed at the height and number of blooms their amaryllis produced. The bulbs were purchased using funds from a VFGC grant along with generous assistance from Southern States that sold them at a reduced price.

In October, students repurposed their saved water bottles into flower vases with the help and support of Salisbury Garden Club. First the students tied leftover ribbons, donated by SGC members, around water bottles and then created simple flower arrangements with donated flowers and herbs from SGC members' gardens. Over two days, 70 children created their own beautiful flower designs to take home. Five garden club members came each day to setup and assist the students, with 25 members donating ribbon and flowers, herbs and greens from their gardens.

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
