

Statewide Awards

Almost 100 awards were submitted by clubs in all six districts representing the terrific programs supported by our members in 2019.

Judging took place Monday, Jan 6 without any complications due to weather. Four panels of judges gathered in Madison to review the applications from 40 clubs not including clubs who sponsored youth activities like posters and poetry. The judges complete point score sheets for each award application to provide feedback. Sample sheets can be found on the VFGC website awards page, providing guidance on what the judges value.

The new President's award, "Paving Tomorrow's Pathways" had a fine award winner as did a new category – "Reclaiming un-usable spaces". Turning a gravel filled parking lot into a garden with raised beds makes an amazing difference. Projects involving youth are still the most popular with yearbooks and newsletters almost as numerous.

Horticulture Therapy is another activity many of our clubs support. There are two different awards: "Horticulture Therapy" and "Horticulture Therapy Garden Project" with a healing garden. Only the one with the healing garden has counterparts at the regional and national levels, so may go on for higher recognition.

More than half the applications received blue ribbons and went on to compete at regional and national levels. Awards have a different system of point scoring than do flower shows. There is only one blue per club size category, scoring 90 and above, but there may be more than one red given, as long as they score 80 and above. Many of the red awards given scored 95 and higher, but were outscored by one that reached 99.

VFGC Awards Vice chairman, Mitzi Cassidy creates the power Point Presentation for the Awards Ceremony in Roanoke. Ribbons, award certificates and checks are presented and the point score sheets returned as the clubs and districts are recognized at the Awards Brunch.

Grant Fundraising Made Easy

Virginia Landscape Design Consultants will be selling packets of butterfly garden seeds to fund grants for landscape design projects for community and public spaces. The seed packs cost \$1 each. Garden clubs and members can purchase seeds singly or in bulk, for your own gardens, table favors for luncheons, to distribute for youth education projects, for monarch waystations, and for planting community butterfly gardens. Seed packs will be available for purchase at district meetings and conventions, and garden club members throughout the state are encouraged to invest \$1 to fund public project grants. Past projects funded by VLDCC include the installation of gardens at schools, libraries, churches and other community sites. Grant details will be announced soon. Laurie Fox, Ph.D.: Laurie Fox is a faculty member in the Horticulture department at Virginia Tech and is based at the Hampton Roads Agricultural Research & Extension Center in Virginia Beach, VA where she has extension and research responsibilities. She received her BS & MS degrees in Horticulture from North Carolina State University, with an emphasis on landscape design, ornamental plant production, and weed science, and her Ph.D. from Wageningen University, the Netherlands. Laurie is an author and the publisher of *Best Plants for Hampton Roads - A Landscape and Garden Companion*. For the past several years Laurie has served as the chairman of the Virginia Flower & Garden Expo held in Virginia Beach.

Gordon W. Chappell, FASLA: Gordon Chappell has taught Landscape Design School for many years in several states. From Georgia, Gordon is a graduate of the University of Georgia, a former garden director at Colonial Williamsburg, and a Fellow in the American Society of Landscape Architecture. His private practice of landscape architecture in James City County focuses primarily on historic properties.

<u>Jack Douglas, ASLA:</u> Jack is the President and Founder of Douglas Associates, a professional landscape design and architecture firm in Richmond, VA. He taught as an instructor for the University of Richmond, Georgetown University and the University of Virginia. His garden designs have been featured in *Southern Living* and *Southern Accents*. Jack received a bachelor's degree in Landscape Architecture from the University of Georgia and a master's degree in Landscape Architecture from Harvard University.

<u>Trevor R. Buckley, Landscape Planner:</u> Trevor is a landscape planner and designer with a keen interest in bringing ecological design principles to bear on projects at all scales. His education and research have taken him across the American West, Europe, and Southeast Asia. After graduating from the College of William & Mary with a B.S. in Geology, he pursued farming and gardening for several seasons. This work led him to the Conway School's graduate program in sustainable landscape planning and design, where he earned a M.S. in Ecological Design. As a member of the landscape architecture studio at Timmons Group, based in Richmond, VA, Trevor works on a wide array of public and private sector projects in MD, VA, and NC.

Neal Beasley, ASLA, ISA Certified Arborist: Neal is a Landscape Architect and Certified Arborist with over 25 years of experience in the fields of Horticulture, Arboriculture, Irrigation, Landscape Construction and Public Gardening. Neal studied horticulture at N. C. State University and was formerly the Manager of Horticulture at the Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden. As an Arborist, he assesses trees during the site analysis to best determine protection strategies or removal. Neal is also on the team of the Timmons Group in Richmond. Neal is the co-author of "Recycling Urban Storm water: 1050K Street, NW Washington, DC" 2007.

Destructive and Invasive Insects: Emerald Ash Borers, Brown Marmorated Stinkbugs and now the Spotted Lanternfly

The beautiful tall ash trees in my neighborhood and elsewhere have died in the last several years, because of the EAB, or emerald ash borer, which came into this country in 2002.

The invasive brown marmorated stinkbugs, or BMSB's, have been very destructive as well. They were first spotted in Pennsylvania in 1998 and Delaware, West Virginia and Virginia by 2004. This insect has now migrated to such far-flung countries of the world as Canada, Chile, Russia, Serbia, Greece, France and Spain.

Entomologists call the stinkbug "highly polyphagous," meaning it will eat a staggering range of things. A 2018 article in The New Yorker magazine states, "So far, scientists have discovered more than 250 plants

that the brown marmorated stinkbug will consume. Together, those plants represent every major agricultural and horticultural sector of the American economy: vegetables, fruit trees, berries, nuts, ornamental plants, and row crops, including sweet corn, cotton, soybeans, and virtually every other legume." ¹


Stinkbugs also eat many different species of deciduous trees, including birches, maples, dogwoods, magnolias, willows, sycamores, hemlocks, elms and oaks, among others.

Now a new destructive and invasive insect, the Spotted Lanternfly, has been spotted in Pennsylvania and more recently in the eastern part of Virginia. The Spotted Lanternfly is a native of China, India and Vietnam and will eat valuable agricultural crops including fruit and may consume hardwood. I spoke with Eric Day of the Department of Entomology at Virginia Tech. He said Tech is working in conjunction with other universities on ways to control the spread and destruction of this pest. It is a potentially very serious threat to apples, peaches, grapes and a variety of other crops. Although the lanternfly is now in the eastern part of our state, Mr. Day was cautiously optimistic that it may be awhile before it migrates to the western part of the state. By then, the hope is that there may be some controls in place from the ongoing research.

Most adult spotted Lanternflies freeze to death and do not survive the winter. However, their eggs survive the winter with the nymphs beginning to hatch in May. The best way to eliminate Lanternflies is to destroy the egg masses before the nymphs begin to hatch. The Lanternfly lays their eggs on a flat surface such as tree trunks, branches, rocks and equipment stored outdoors, even plant containers. The egg masses resemble grey or tan mud or mortar splotches. Once an egg mass has been identified, it can be destroyed by scrapping the mass off with a putty knife into a bag or container filled with rubbing alcohol or hand sanitizer. They can also be smashed, but the rubbing alcohol and hand sanitizer have been the most effective.²


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
