Summer Gardening

While we all hope activity will be less restricted by the summer, our gardening can go on no matter what.

Since Virginia stretches across several plant hardiness zones, ranging from 5a (in the mountains in the west) to 8a (on the eastern shore), one suggestion doesn't work for everyone. So, as you read this article, keep your own plant hardiness zone in mind. I'm in zone 6a, but just a few miles away people are in zone 5b, in a special microclimate. You can find the USDA plant hardiness maps at planthardiness.ars.usda.gov.

If you are going to plant vegetables, Virginia Cooperative Extension has an excellent planting guide, with separate charts for each Virginia hardiness zone (you used to need to calculate the dates on your own). This guide is available at: www.pubs.ext.vt.edu/content/dam/pubs_ext_vt_edu/426/426-331/SPES-170.pdf

This guide can help you restrain your desire to plant early. Sometimes planting early doesn't do much more than slow your plants down. But if the soil is too cold and wet, seeds may rot instead of germinating; if the temperature goes too low, some transplants may be killed. Unless you don't mind heartache and unnecessary costs, it's a good idea to follow the guides.

Here's a list of some common vegetables that can be planted in June in my zone: beans, cucumbers, eggplant (transplants) melons, okra, peppers

(transplants), potatoes (yep, you can plant them this late), pumpkins, summer and winter squash, corn, and tomatoes (transplants). If you live in a warmer zone, these can be planted in May. Besides tomatoes, peppers, greens, and beans, winter squash is one of my favorites. Last year I discovered a new (for me) variety of butternut squash, Tahitian butternut. It makes very long neck, sweet squash. Since I'm a lazy cook, I love having squash that requires very little seed removal.

If you are planning to prune shrubs, the following shrubs may be pruned in June and July: arborvitae, azalea, barberry, boxwood, deutzia, forsythia, Harry Lauder walking stick, holly, hydrangea (spring blooming), lilac, mountain laurel, quince, rhododendron, viburnum (deciduous), pussy willow, and yew. Pruning pretty much closes down after July (rhododendron and sumac may be pruned as late as August), and doesn't resume until November (as plants go dormant). Living Legacy Trees

During the 2015-2017 VFGC administration, we raised funds to plant trees along the Journey Through Hallowed Grounds National Scenic Byway, a 180-mile corridor from Monticello in Charlottesville to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania along Routes 15 and 20. The living legacy trees would honor and be a living memorial for the 620,000 men who gave their lives in the War Between the States.

The first of our Living Legacy Trees were planted and dedicated at Woodberry Forest Community School on Route 15 near Madison on November 7, 2017. After a lengthy search, three other locations were found and 100 of our Living Legacy trees were planted in April.

The first site is in Historic Buckland, a small town that is on the National Register of Historic Places and the Virginia Landmark Register. Fifty of our Living Legacy trees have been planted in a large open area near the intersection of Routes 15 and 29. There is a small museum on the property. The Buckland Historic Society has also planted trees in this open area and will help care for the trees. Forty trees were planted on the road frontage near Little Oatlands which is located between Leesburg and Middleburg on Route 15. The trees planted at Buckland and Little Oatlands were red oak, red maple, redbud and willow oak.

The third site is near Gilbert's Corner and the historic Mt. Zion Church at the intersection of Routes 15 and 50 in Loudon County. The church was used as a hospital during the War Between the States. Both Confederate and Union soldiers are buried in the church cemetery. The planting site is between the church and the highway. A total of ten dogwoods and redbuds were planted. We hope to have an early fall dedication of our trees.

Department of Conservation and Recreation Virginia Scenic Rivers Program: Designation of Gray's Creek

The Scenic Rivers Program was established in 1970 to identify, designate and help protect rivers and streams that possess outstanding scenic, recreational, historic and natural characteristics of statewide significance for future generations.

In 2019, as the result of a project initiated by Surry County Garden Club, the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) completed a Scenic River evaluation of Surry County's Gray's Creek. Based on the evaluation, six miles of this creek were deemed eligible for inclusion in the Virginia Scenic River System. The designation of Gray's Creek as a Virginia scenic waterway was recommended, with DCR as the administering agency. Both houses of the Virginia General Assembly submitted bills to this effect during the legislative session recently concluded. On February 22, the notification was recorded:

House Bill 1612 – Grants scenic rivers designation on Gray's Creek in Surry County. HB 1612 passed the House 90-8 and passed the Senate 40-0.

One of the program's strengths is the partnership forged between citizens, local governments and the state. Numerous local and state organizations worked diligently to bring this designation recommendation forward in conjunction with DCR and the County's Administrative and Economic Development Staffs, including the Surry Garden Club (proposal initiator), Surry County Historical Society, Preservation Virginia, Surry County Sheriff's Department, Department of Game and Inland Fisheries, and the James River Association. Many individual County citizens also assisted with providing private watercraft and navigational support, referenced knowledge of the creek's historical and wildlife features, and informative congressional interface.

The offices of Delegate Emily Brewer and Senator Louise Lucas have sponsored the designation legislation. It is intended for the Gray's Creek designation to occur in 2020 during the 50th anniversary of the Scenic Rivers Program. Inclusion in this program will notably strengthen Surry County's economic and tourism development profile.

DISTRICT & CLUB NEWS

Plant America Grant By Jean Tremaine, Amelia County GC (P)

Amelia County Garden Club is one of the smallest clubs in the VFGC with just 23 members. Nevertheless, the members of the club

maintain a fairly large, mature public garden for its county as their primary community service project.

ACGC's Memorial Garden is roughly symmetrical with brick paths, four inner quadrants and outer quadrants, hedges and fencing, entrances with archways, a centerpiece statue and a pergola with seating for about ten people. The garden is a Certified Monarch Waystation filled with flowering perennials, shrubs and trees.

ACGC applied for a Plant America grant from the National Garden Clubs, Inc. in 2018. Multiple conifers and flowering deciduous trees were diseased after a record-breaking wet year following drought-ridden years.

By the time the grant money was awarded, five trees were dead or dying. The grant helped ACGC remove dead trees and purchase new trees and mulch.

ACGC planted a large evergreen cryptomeria that they decorated during the holiday season with white twinkle lights. It adds soft color and texture year-round. A red Japanese maple with glowing autumn foliage was planted in another space. A 'Cherokee Brave' dogwood and a standard form 'Pinky Winky' panicle hydrangea was added for spring/summer color to other quadrants.



"It's important to us that the garden offers four seasons of interest so visitors can see something lovely every day of the year," said ACGC President Jeanie O'Malley. "The garden is a labor of love that the club tends with great care. We knew we had to replace these trees quickly to keep the garden looking good and are just so grateful to the NGC for this grant."

The Garden is enjoyed by all ages. Children leave painted stones there. Prom pictures are staged there. Brides use it for photo shoots. The local rehab center brings their residents there for outings. Government

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workers and visitors to the courthouse walk its brick paths to clear their heads and get a fresh perspective.

ACGC's Memorial Garden is a place where people come together. Local Horticulture/Landscaping students learn hands-on gardening techniques and members team up with the Boy Scouts to spread mulch. Free container planting classes for the public are sometimes offered there by ACGC. And Mrs. O'Malley gives tours of the garden to other nonprofits. The Plant America grant has helped all these activities and the Garden itself to continue to flourish in Amelia County.

HISTORIC GARDENS RESTORATION

When the City of Virginia Beach purchased the Francis Land Historic House and its surrounding property in 1975, the physical work of restoration began. The May Farm Garden Club of Kingston took on the task of establishing a formal garden. Under the leadership of Patsy Cameron, President, Wanda Hudgins, Project and Committee Chairman for the Francis Land House Formal Garden's Installation, and Glenda Knowles, the Committee visited several Virginia historic properties to research the layout of formal gardens. Once the plan was approved by the City, May Farm Garden Club donated plants and materials, including heirloom boxwoods. The May 1988 dedication of the Formal Garden and a celebratory grand reception were held at the Friends of Francis Land House Spring meeting with Mayor-elect Meyera Oberndorf participating as the guest of honor. The May Farm Garden Club maintained the Formal Garden for several years until it was no longer feasible for them to do so.

As fate would have it, the Lynnhaven Heritage Garden Club, chartered in March 2013, was looking for a long-term project in which to work with the City in their beautification efforts. The Formal Garden at the Francis Land House suited their purpose perfectly, and May Farm Garden Club was pleased to have Lynnhaven Heritage adopt the project. Under the leadership of Lynnhaven Heritage's president, Bev Hunter, this new club with only eight members set to work.



They sent samples of the ailing boxwoods to Virginia Tech's Agricultural Research and Extension Center for care and guidance, amended the beds and provided plant material from their gardens, including the Lynnhaven Heritage Garden Club's flower, the heirloom Columbine, Aquilegia vulgaris. With the City's help, benches were painted, and fences/gates were repaired. Members re-laid the pathway border bricks and pathway clamshells. Seasonal color has continued.

Cherry Trees

I am very pleased to announce that The Rappahannock County Garden Club was able to plant 365 blooming cherry, dogwood and redbud trees in Little Washington and Sperryville and environs this past month. A local Club supporter offered us \$5000 to buy and plant the trees in town, and helped with our fundraising efforts. In the end we raised \$7,000 which allowed us to reach some public spaces like the Firehouse, the Library, The Park and the Visitor's Center.

Even though our town is small, it was still an effort to carry out all the recruitment and organization of the project with over 50 gardens involved. The Mayor and Town Council were very supportive of the beautification efforts and offered us much assistance, but after all the flyers and adoption forms were sent to everyone, we started to go door to door to encourage people to sign up. Those efforts were very successful and much of the town was covered. We also held a "Planting Seminar" with experts telling us what we needed to know to keep the trees healthy, with planting direction handouts. The local Newspaper, Rappahannock News, was incredibly supportive of the project and ran story after story keeping people up with our progress, with great pictures. The Inn at Little Washington offered dinner for two for the first person who donated \$5,000 to the project and the Three Blacksmiths restaurant in Sperryville offered two dinners for two to the first persons who donated \$2000.



Just as we were getting ready to plant this past fall, we were introduced to Friends of the Rappahannock (FOR) based in Fredericksburg, which has a lot of money through donations and grants to plant thousands of trees in the counties that border the Rappahannock River. We contacted them and they were thrilled to learn of our volunteer efforts and offered us, free of charge, all the trees we could use! That is when we grew the project to include Sperryville.

We started planting in March when the first paid order for 50 Yoshino trees arrived. Twenty-five of those trees went to Avon Hall in little Washington, the most visible spot we could find (and the owner gave us a very generous donation). The rest we sold to Garden Club members at a very reasonable price.


