

Drama, plot development, performers, design, audience, set...all terms used in describing live theatre. Live theatre ignites the imagination. Igniting the imagination creates passion. Passion in the hands of a creative mind is sublime, especially in the hands of a gardener's theatre.

Creating passion in the garden theatre invites the elements: drama, improvisation, comedy, tragedy and history. The live performers, of course, are the chosen plants because of their color, aroma, growth habit or usefulness to its environment. The stage settings are the curved, tiered, sloped, watery, shady or full sun landscaped areas. But, where does one start in creating garden theatre?

Death is drama. Carnivorous plants thrive on death. Sarracenias, or pitcher plants, add theatre to a water garden area with their varied shapes, colors, and heights; while

eliminating some of the bad players in the garden with their unique trapping mechanisms.

There are eight different species of Sarracenia, all are native to North America. Sarracenia's highly specialized leaves or tubes, are narrow and cylindrical, tapering towards the soil. The wide mouth at the top of the tube is often covered with a wide leaf protrusion. This protrusion (hood) is also a "landing pad" for its prey; a specialized stage set, as these

hood glands produce a sweetsmelling lure or nectar, which is right above the digestive juices in the tube.

The nectar is an intoxicating narcotic called 'conjine' that causes paralysis then death; think King Lear, Macbeth or Henry V.

Once the prey enters under the hood, it is directed by thin, sharp hairs that cover its underside. Prey cannot easily move against the grain of hairs because of their sharp tips, so they follow the grain to the digestive juices. The hairs themselves are also slick, so any prey trying to grasp them

will lose their footing.

After falling in the tube, flying insects cannot buzz out of these cylinders (tubes) because the beating of their wings causes a vortex within the narrow space that makes flying impossible.

Sarracenia flower once with multiple flowers, but the flower can last from May to September. The flower looks like an umbrella which hangs down high above the tubes. The flowers are as complex and showy as an orchid with the same brilliant coloration



Early European settlers first documented Floridian Sarracenia in 1576. In 1700, Dr. M.S. Sarrazin, of Quebec, further helped in acknowledging this native. Carl Linnaeus named the genus Sarracenia in 1793. William Bartram noted the insect-trapping nature of the pitchers while doubting that the plants benefited from this behavior. Darwin suspected this behavior to be carnivorous in nature, but never studied Sarracenia in detail.

As we create passion in our garden theatres, be sure to delve into those special plantings of "As You Like It", because, you know "All the world's a stage".

- 1) Youth are our future. Through our work as gardeners, we can instill in youth the rewards and joys of gardening. If they plant it, watch it grow, they will eat it. Imagine the joy on a child's face when the bulb they planted in the fall becomes a bright yellow daffodil in the spring. Creating pollinator gardens, wildflower gardens and any other type of gardening with youth. \$50 cash award will be presented annually to the garden club for the most outstanding project involving youth. Must include number of garden club people involved and number of youth
- 2) Plan to restore a public site that has become overgrown, contains dead plants and weeds, or reclaim a public site that has been abandoned. \$50 cash award will be presented annually to the garden club for the most outstanding project either for restoring or reclaiming. Photos must be presented showing before and after completion of work and must include location, time, cost and number of garden club people involved.

Deadline for submitting applications: Follow District (Dec. 1 deadline to District Awards Chairman) and State guidelines with January 25th as the deadline to be received from the state to the Region Awards Chairman. [Note: There is a new application form to be used for all Awards this year. Check out the VFGC website.


