What's New with Awards! By Heidi Sage, VFGC Awards Chairman

The District and State awards reflect the National Awards so that winners at the starting level (District) can go on to complete at the higher levels. That means when National makes changes to their forms and rules, the states and districts follow.

The best place to begin is your District List of Awards to see how your project might fit into the various types of awards offered. Then go to the VFGC web site for more information and the forms you need – like the new cover sheet/application form and the appropriate point score rubric. The rubrics help you write up your application so you can emphasize what the judges will be looking for when they score your application form. Some awards have been discontinued like "Special Achievement", and new ones have been added like "Food Bank Donations". On the VFGC web site the changes are in red. www.virginiagardenclubs.org Click on "Awards" at the left side near the top. Most awards are due to the District Chairman by December first. The district lists are accessible from the website; scroll down the page and click on your district. The VFGC yearbook (small white binder) has the lists of state, SAR, and NGC awards; pgs 60-81.

One of the major changes is to club sizes. The Extra Large size had been eliminated and replaced with a two or more club option. The new size breakdown is below:

6. CATEGORIES BY CLUB SIZE: Some awards specify awards according to club size. Club size is determined by the <u>number of members</u> as of December 1st on whom VFGC dues are paid, including Active, Associate, Inactive, Honorary, etc.

i Small Club 20 members or less
 ii Medium Club 21 - 50 members
 iii Large club 51 + members

iv Two or more clubs

Another major change is to the application form itself. It requires this new cover sheet which allows you to use all three one sided pages to describe the project with photos wherever you wish to place them. Notice the spaces up top for the various award names and numbers. Here is the new Award Application Cover Sheet:

All applications are to be submitted electronically unless otherwise noted in award description. Send to your State Awards Chairman by the requested due date. Only awards submitted through State Chairmen will be accepted.

A third change is the point score sheet now called a point scoring rubric. This form is how the judges will evaluate your project. There are no longer 5 questions to answer. Rather you are free to write as you wish, but it is best to reflect what the judges will value most highly. Below is the basic rubric. Some of the awards have special ones which are found on the VFGC website. This information is on the national website as well, but may take longer to locate what you want as there are so many more options.

Decoupage Pumpkins

Great instructions: Use Mod Podge to paint over the pumpkin, a small area at a time. Place a Pressed Flower or a fresh Flat Leaf on the covered area. Then paint over the flower or leaf with more Mod Podge. Continue until you have placed the flowers/leaves over the complete pumpkin. Pick up the pumpkin by the stem and paint the underside. Place the wet pumpkin on a Styrofoam plate. It will dry overnight. You can add a twisted wire around the stem to look like a curled stem. By Brenda McManaway

FINE ARTS AND FLOWERS Oct 2021

Bread-and-Salt Dish Khlebnikov I.P. and Sons & Co., Russian Grace Morris: VFGC Third Vice President

I fell in love with this Russian "Bread and Salt" presentation plate the minute I saw the picture. When I saw it in the Museum, it was even more beautiful than I imagined. I thought "what a challenge it will be to interpret." I love a challenge! After much thought, I decided to use elegant white lilies within my circular sculpture, which I painted silver to represent the silver plate. Fern shoots and eucalyptus are used to interpret the intertwined vines in the design of the plate, along with a touch of blue for the Kherson Province Coat of Arms in the center.

We were drawn to this piece of art by its commanding sense of presence. It evokes strength through its dominate line and use of boldly contrasting colors. The sinuous wood adds a strong line to the floral composition, while giving the impression of snake-like movement. Bright orange Pincushion Protea and yellow Craspedia were selected for their texture, color and form. They create a strong contrast with the burgundy Leucadendron. Robellini palm was abstracted to mimic the serrated edges of the mask. This palm also defines the shape of the botanical mass. The



lower variegated leaf was abstracted to interpret the beak on the mask. Protea, Robellini Palm and Leucadendron are all plants native to Africa.

Chippendale Sofa Unknown, American Valerie Story: VFGC First Vice President

Imagine a work of art that has come to life...in flowers. The colors, textures, lines, and emotional energy of the painting or a piece of furniture are all interpreted in the floral design, displayed next to the artwork itself. I started thinking about colors: brown, and yellow. A lot of yellow! I decided I wanted the container to represent the sofa, and the design to be symbolic of the colors and content rather than a recreation. There were some specific rules about what materials we could and could not use, with the emphasis on using fresh material as opposed to wood and fabrics like the wool used to upholster this sofa. The curvature of the sofa is being used to create and form the floral design. The plant material compliments the sofa adding the interpretative license



chosen with the color, textures and spaces in mind. The yellow and reddish brown flowers were chosen to compliment and add contrast to the monochromic American Chippendale sofa.

Epergne Thomas Pitts, English Mary Owen: VFGC President

The elegance of this late 17th century English epergne is exemplified through the selection and placement of the floral elements of my design. Typical of the period, a mass arrangement with formal balance that is somewhat triangular in form, using harmonizing colors is appropriate. The epergne, being an aristocratic piece, the selection of container was an attempt to accentuate the elaborate design. Through the use of monochromatic colors (also typical of the period) for the arms, the center becomes the elaborate example of this dramatic piece.
