

#### **NEWS AND TIBITS**

There is always confusion regarding "good plants and berries" and "bad plants and berries". Several have mentioned that the nandina berry is harmful to animals and birds and these ber-

ries last for months. The severity of harm is up for debate. The US Department of Agriculture and most states classify Nandina as a noxious, not native and invasive weed. However, this plant is still planted without constraint in yards. The major thought is that the berry, which has cyanide, can kill birds and other animals. If, the growers still want the nandina plant in their yards, maybe the best approach would be to remove the berries.

January is always a slow month for us, these cold days can be a real struggle. The best way to get through them is to take the pressure off as much as possible & make sure to get outside everyday for at least one brisk walk. Like our plants, we need a dormancy to refresh & recharge knowing that come February it'll be all go again trimming hedges and shrubs before bird nesting season, cutting hazels & willows and planting bare-root if the soil allows. No pressure, but if you're feeling up to it, here are our five January gardening tips which focus on bringing you bursts of joy this month.

- 1. ORDER SEEDS FOR BRIGHTER DAYS AHEAD. Remember organic (for wildlife) and open pollinated (for seed saving) are best.
- 2. CLEAR & TIDY. A tidy workspace is a healthy mind for the year ahead. I like to tidy things up, clean what I can so it's all good to go. Sharpen your tools as well, nothing worse than getting into a job realizing the shears are blunt.
- 3. SMALL JOBS, SUPER SATISFYING. Whether raking a path, weeding a bit of the patio or planting a pot to sit by your door or on a windowsill. Take half an hour, choose a little task & get to work.
- 4. RAINY DAY WILDLIFE WATCHING. On rainy days we venture inside & tackle office work which can be quite tedious. One of the things that helps me stay sane is having a bird feeding station outside the window & looking up every now & again to watch their aerial acrobatics.
- 5. TAKE 5 TO COUNT 5! Take five minutes to dive outside & see, smell or listen to five early signs of Spring. Even on the darkest days of January, the garden is already starting to burst back into life. Look for willow catkins, crocus flowers, snowdrops, the first frogspawn (eggs). See what treasures your garden, park or favorite walk has to be discovered!

## **SAR News**


Marty Bowers, Director of the South Atlantic Region, has shared important information for upcoming events, plans and goals.
