Loving Your Native Bees

and Doing all You can for Them by Lesley Mack

Like oxygen, we could not live without our native bees. But which native bee(s) should we thank and support?

Well, there are about ~4,000 native bee species in North America, including some ~50 species of Bumblebees. There are some ~770 bee species native to the Eastern U.S. Wow, that is a lot of thank yous.

Much has been written and discussed on the topic of native bees, thank goodness. For this article, I will focus on one of the amazing aspects of our beloved natives; "Specialist" bees and "Generalist" bees. Roughly 25% of the ~770 species (=193) of bees native to the Eastern United States are pollen "Specialists".

Over the millennia, Specialist bees and their host plants have co-evolved. Before climate change the blooming native plants warmed and flowered at the same time the native bees warmed and emerged. If the timing is right when the bee emerges and the plant is in bloom, the Specialist bee gets its pollen, can produce and feed its babies, *and* the plant is able to reproduce. If the timing is *not* right...then both the bee and the plant fail. The Specialist bee, like the name implies, means that they forage for pollen only from certain plants. These plants flower at a certain time of year.

Imagine only being able to eat one kind of food once a year. Diets of Specialist bees range from one plant family to a single plant species. Some Specialist bees feed from only one kind of plant, and some on two, or at most three kinds. If there is no flower for the bee, how can the bee or plant survive?

You have heard "this" before..." because of habitat loss...pesticides, invasive species, and climate change"...the Specialist bees' ability to forage is decreasing, putting the bee and its host plant in peril.

So, what can you do? Plant natives, eliminate invasive species, remove non-natives when you can, avoid pesticides, provide water and nesting sites, don't fuss over the lawn. You have also heard those before.

So, what about the other ~577 Generalist Native Bees on the east coast? Well, they are not such 'picky' foragers. They often visit a wide variety of flower types and species when seeking out pollen. Imagine being able to go to your favorite 'all you can eat' restaurant and eating to your heart's content? Sure.

When there is a multitude of native plants, each flower presents a different dish of pollen each with a different nutritional value. Nectar is a bee's carbohydrates, while pollen is a source of proteins. Pollen is used to feed bee's larvae as well as themselves.

Long-horned bees (Melissodes robstior) and Leaf cutter bees (Magachile perihirta) are common Generalist bees. Long-horned bee species number ~200 in North America. Leaf cutter bee species number ~1,500 worldwide, with ~22 species in Virginia.

Flower Show Schedules

Flower Shows are being planned, schedules are being written, excitement is building, and this is wonderful for our Garden Clubs. Your Garden Club must vote to sponsor a Flower Show and then appoint a committee to write the Schedule. All this happens months and months before the Show takes place. At least 3 months before the Show, the Schedule must be sent to your DISTRICT Flower Show Schedule Evaluator. Any necessary changes are to be made by your Flower Show committee. Then it is sent on to the Chairman of Schedule Evaluations for one more final check.

Who are these Evaluators and how do I reach them? Their names and districts are found on page 20 of the VFGC's "little white book" that your GC President will have. Their contact information is also in the back of the book.

Schedule Formats to help you write a Schedule can be found on the NGC Website under Flower Show School Resources. Then go to FS School Forms and Information and press Downloads. A Small Standard Show Format Sample will appear, and a Standard Flower Show Schedule Format will appear. Choose the one you would like to use for the type of show your Club would like to have. These Formats are extremely helpful in writing a Flower Show Schedule.
