#### Required Books to have:

Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017 Edition, NGC Horticulture Exhibiting & Judging, both available on the NGC Website, or 1-800-550-6007. Recommended books are Hortulana, the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Edition, and Designing by Types, by Harriott Osborne.

**Flower Show Procedure** will cover an explanation of the Education Division and judging educational exhibits, an explanation of the Youth/Sponsored Groups Division, requirements to become an accredited flower show judge, judging etiquette/ethics, and a review of writing a flower show schedule with emphasis on format and general rules.

**Horticulture** will cover creating a horticulture schedule, a review of general requirements for NGC Horticulture Top Exhibitor Awards, a review of judging qualities on the Horticulture Point scoring Form, a review of horticulture commenting vocabulary and judging procedures. Cut Herbs will be studied along with combination plantings.

**Design** will cover creating a design schedule, creative staging options, characteristics of creative design, the elements & principles as they relate to creative design, dynamic balance, plastic organization, juxtaposition and abstraction, general requirements for NGC Design Section Top Exhibitor Awards, a review of judging qualities found on the design point scoring form, and a review of design commenting vocabulary and judging procedures. Creative Designs will be studied.

## Glen Burnie Garden Club Plants Marigolds

#### With Students

On a trip to St. John, New Brunswick, Canada in September 2017, Sue Spangler saw something she thought was remarkable: a garden of bright orange marigolds, planted within the median strip of the town's main throughway, blocks and blocks in length. The flowers had been raised from seeds by the school children of St. John and were planted during one marathon session, an undertaking that has occurred in the city every year for over 20 years and has earned a place in the Guinness Book of Records 5 times, for the most children planting flowers at the same time. Sue brought the idea back to Glen Burnie Garden Club, and members enthusiastically began to plan their own "Marigold Project", but on a much smaller scale.

Quarles Elementary School in Winchester was invited to participate in the project, and in April, 2018 club members helped kindergarten and first grade students plant seeds in small starter pots. Five kindergarten and four first grades, with approximately 175 children, were involved in the project. Club members worked with the children in small groups. While one group

planted, another had a mini lesson about seeds and the importance of planting gardens in our community. The seeds were then cared for by the children and their teachers for the next 6 weeks.

In May, less than 2 weeks before school was closed for the summer, the club returned to help the children put their infant plants into the selected garden beds, located beneath the school's sign in the front



yard of the school. The beds were devoid of flowers, and members had to prepare the beds prior to planting by removing several years' worth of mulch, turning the soil, edging the border, and removing weeds. On a sunny warm afternoon, 5 of the original 9 classes brought their plants to the beds and were helped by club members to carefully plant the marigolds. Again we worked in small groups. While one group planted, another group sat in the shade under a tree and learned about birds, bees, and gardening from club member Trisha Boyd, a Master Gardener.

During the summer, club members watered, fed, and weeded the beds. The marigolds flourished and provided a pretty display for passersby. Our hope was to inspire future gardeners and to teach a bit about seeds, and the importance of flowers in our world. Our Marigold Project will not make the Guinness Book of Records but we hope when school resumes in the Fall, the young gardeners can point to the marigold bed with pride and say, "Look what I did!"

## Continued from page 6: Years 2 – Present 2019 – 2022

In the second year of the project (2019), plans were made for the club to provide all materials needed to start the seeds in the classroom, but giving teachers leadership of actual planting and teaching in their individual classrooms. The club would return 9 weeks later and help the children



place the small plants in the garden under their school sign. Sharing with teachers the hands-on aspects of the project encouraged the club to look beyond one school and to investigate the possibility of involving all four of the city's elementary schools in year 3 (2020).

Years 3 and 4: During the Pandemic, there was no interaction with children but members did plant marigolds both years at Quarles Elementary School for the children to enjoy and gave teachers information to share with the students.

### Year 5: 2022

This year the Marigold Project was expanded to include all first grade classes in all four of the city elementary schools. Members gave live presentations in two of the



schools. These were recorded and distributed to the remaining two schools. All four schools were given all materials needed to raise marigold seedlings in their individual classrooms. Additionally, one preschool was included, involving the 4 and 5 year old students. A total of 291 students are involved in this year's project!

We now await warmer

temperatures to hold our planting days. Several plants will be placed on each of the four school campuses for the students to enjoy. The majority of the plants will be placed around the circumference of a small traffic circle near the town's one city high school. Garden clubbers will make sure all areas are kept watered during the summer insuring the efforts of the children and the teachers will be enjoyed by all city residents.



Each year we have benefitted from a grant from a VFGC Youth Grant to help fund this great project!
