What is the Impact of Climate Change on Birds

Bird populations are declining around the world and while many factors contribute such as habitat loss, outdoor cats, pesticides, and window collusions, it is increasingly clear that climate change is an important driver behind this worrying trend. For any species to survive with climate change it will depend on how well they can adapt. Birds are impacted in many ways both direct and indirect.

Direct Impacts:

It can change where birds live, the timing of their migration patterns and egg laying and even the sizes and shapes of their bodies. Data sets have shown that many North American bird species have been shifting their winter and breeding ranges northward over time, which means some birds have been seen further north than a few decades ago. Some measurements have shown that in many species, birds' bodies are getting smaller and their wings are getting longer as global temperatures heat up. Smaller bodies may help disperse excess body heat in warming habitats.

Indirect Impacts:

<u>Drought and fire</u>—Intense drought and more frequent wildfires can alter and destroy nesting areas and habitat which vulnerable species rely.

<u>Sea-level rise</u>—As sea-levels rise some species as the saltmarsh sparrows can easily be drowned by high tides. Their survival will depend on how quickly new marshes form further inland. <u>Disease</u>—Drought and warmer temperatures are driving the spread of West Nile virus. It is threatening wild birds especially corvids as crows and jays.

<u>Timing mismatches</u>—Many birds initiate their northward flight based on day length and not temperature, so because of a shift in climate conditions, seasonal food sources that they rely on such as caterpillars may already be past their peak for the year, reducing breeding success.

What can we do?

Plant trees and include native plants in your landscape as food sources for the birds. Try to reduce your carbon footprint by making wise choices on how we live and travel As Garden Club members educate and promote projects in your community that are bird friendly.

THE IDEA EXCHANGE:

<u>"Easy Floral Design for Big Impact"</u>. (Many thanks to Loy Holt for sharing this great idea!)

The Berkeley Garden Club has always had great speakers. Our members have always been intrigued by designs but many think they look too complicated for them to make. We had so much fun at this meeting that we've decided to do it twice a year. Members will be shown step by step how to make a simple modern design working from the book "Designs Made Easy." By Barbara D. May, Design Week 1. Please bring the following materials:

- A container or tuna can
- Pin holder or Oasis cut to fit your container (Soak your oasis before bringing it)
- Floral adhesive for your pin
- 3 stems of something straight and tall such as iris leaves or a straight flower
- A large floral point such as a camellia, a lily or hydrangea
- Greens such as rhododendron, camellia leaves, fatsia, or aucuba

We will use a creative and fun container or a beautiful flower as the showpiece. We will start from the beginning and show you how to make your oasis or pin fit and stay in your container. If you are unable to participate in making the design in the workshop, listening to the guidance and watching others efforts will still be educational and fun.
