LEGISLATIVE REPORT:

All of us understand the invasive nature of English Ivy, and the damage it can inflict on native plants as well as infrastructure if it is not contained.

Both the House and Senate in Richmond passed a bill in February to help curb that damage. The bill authorizes, but does not require, a locality to adopt an ordinance prohibiting the sale of English Ivy. Violations could be punished by civil penalty not to exceed \$50 for a first violation and not to exceed \$200 for a subsequent violation within 12 months.

The Virginia Agribusiness Council and Virginia Nursery and Landscaping Association opposed the bill, preferring to let consumers have the right to decide whether or not to purchase the product.

This proposal passed both House and Senate in February. Governor Youngkin vetoed the bill.

Common Violets Deserve a Closer Look

Small violets herald the arrival of spring throughout North Carolina and Virginia. There are more than 70 species of the native purple, blue, yellow or white flowers in North America. But there is more to violets than meets the eye. A weed to some people and a sugary treat to others, violets are also an important food source to wildlife and deserve a closer look.

One interesting fact about violets is their means of seed dispersal. While many flowering plants rely on wind, water, birds and animals to move seeds from the plant of origin to a new environment, violets rely on assistance from some

tiny helpers – ants. Myrmecochory, or ant farming, is a mutually beneficial relationship between violets and ants. Violet seeds have an attachment to the outer seed coat called an elaiosome, and it is rich in proteins and lipids. Ants gather the seeds and carry them home to their nests as a food source. Once the elaiosome is consumed by the ants and their larvae, the unharmed seed is then discarded, or “planted” in an enriched spot, underground and out of sight of predators. Both violets and ants benefit from this unique arrangement. Several other spring ephemerals rely on myrmecochory, including bloodroot, red and white trilliums, hepatica and trout lily.



Then, there is the importance of the plants to wildlife. Violets are the host plant for several butterflies, including the great spangled fritillary. Female fritillaries lay their eggs in late summer. Caterpillars hatch in the fall and sleep until spring, when they awaken and eat the leaves of violets. Valuable pollinators such as honey bees, bumble bees, mason bees and blue orchard bees consume the nectar of these early spring flowers. Birds such as quail, juncos, mourning doves and turkeys eat the seeds of violets, as do mice and other small animals.

Violet flowers are edible and are rich in Vitamin C. They can be crystallized, or sugared, and eaten as candy or used to garnish cakes and other desserts. Fresh violets can be used in salads, and to make jelly, syrup and vinegar.

Unfortunately, if you Google native violets you will find numerous articles about eradicating them from your lawn. Based on the benefits of violets to birds, butterflies and bees, it is safer, easier and less costly to learn to live with, and appreciate the small spring flowers than to eliminate them.
