PLANT AMERICA - Plant for Pollinators

National Garden Clubs President Brenda Moore wants to encourage NGC members to make our gardens more than just beautiful. That's why she created the National Garden Clubs Pollinator Garden Certification program. Our gardens can support birds, bees and other insects, and this program provides the incentive to take additional steps to make sure we're providing all the components to help pollinators thrive.

They have created a checklist to make sure you have everything you need to support pollinators:

- 01 Food sources
- 02 Water source
- 03 Areas to raise young

You probably already have several plants that provide pollen and nectar. But could you add a few native plants that are perhaps a better source of food? Could you add a shrub that has berries for wintertime nutrition? You don't have to install a pond, but what about a birdbath? Consider adding a heater for fresh water in the winter. May of us have birdhouses in our gardens, but if not, a small, inconspicuous log or brush pile can provide a safe place for insects to next.

In addition to providing food, water, and shelter, think about your gardening practices and what you can do better to support pollinators. Naturalists are encouraging us to "leave the leaves" in the fall for insects that overwinter in leaves, and to wait until spring for garden cleanup since some insect larvae stay in hollow stems until spring.

We all want to do what we can to support pollinators-their lives depend on us. By making a few tweaks to our gardens we can make them feel right at home!

ANGELONIA OR SUMMER SNAPDRAGON

Recently the Roanoke Times published an article by Norman Winter, the "Garden Guy" about Angelonia augustifolia. I was interest-

ed because last summer I planted a cluster of these plants in pink and purple for the first time and was very pleased with their performance of providing color all summer long.

According to Winter, the National Garden Bureau has designated 2024 as the "Year of the "Angelonia," or the



annual of the year. A native of Mexico and the West Indies, this plant, an annual in Virginia, is a member of the Plantaginacea or plantain family which includes such members as Penstemon, Linaria, Digitalis, and snapdragon. "This plant gives the South a summer plant that blooms all summer to early fall and and looks like a snapdragon or foxglove."

Angelonia comes in the colors of pink, purple, blue, and white. There are three distinct types, Standard, Super and Cascade. The Standard spikes can be 18-30 inches tall with an 18-inch spread. The Super can reach 30-40 inches tall and 16 inches wide, and the Cascade group can reach 8-14 inches with a 30 inch spread. Angelonias are hardy plants that need full sun, require no deadheading or pruning and are adaptable to drought conditions. They are also pest and disease resistant. They are truly low maintenance. These plants will do well in containers, and cascading varieties will enhance hanging baskets. The three types qualify as thrillers, fillers, and spillers.

The tubular blooms of Angelonia are attractive to pollinators because of their fragrance, and they are deer resistant. They are truly a dependable plant; my only regret is that they are not native to Virginia and are not perennials in this area.

VFGC SCOLARSHIPS AWARDED

BRD Scholarship Committee Report – March 27, 2024 **s**ubmitted by BRD Chair Carol Buriak

The VFGC Scholarship Committee was provided \$8,000 to award for the upcoming academic year beginning in Fall of 2024. \$2,000 of this total was designated as the Betsey Edwards Scholarship with the remaining \$6,000 designated as VFGC scholarship money which could be divided as the committee wished. This was a change from last year when the committee had \$13,000 to award but it was restricted by specific scholarship requirements.

Happily, two students who had applied last year and were awarded scholarship monies chose to re-apply again. They did not disappoint!

Ashleigh Elizabeth Mann was awarded the Mina Adams \$3,000 scholarship last year. She is now a Junior at Longwood University and has maintained a 3.96 GPA in her major of Environmental Science with a Microbiology minor. The committee awarded her the Betsy Edwards Scholarship of \$2000.00 plus an additional \$500.00 from VFGC. Her application will be forwarded to the South Atlantic Region for scholarship consideration at the regional level. It will then be forwarded to the National Garden Clubs, Inc. for their scholarship consideration.

Elizabeth Marie Eroshenko, is a Junior at Virginia Polytechnic Insitute and State University pursuing a degree in Environmental Science. She is interested in the effects of climate change on soil and has maintained a GPA of 3.93. The committee awarded her a \$2500.00 VFGC Scholarship.

Trinity Starr Shirlen is a Sophomore at Randolph College pursuing a degree in Environmental Science/ Biology. She was awarded a \$1000.00 VFGC Scholarship.

Laila Grace Buckman is a Freshman at Virginia Polytechnic Insitute and State University pursuing a degree in Fish and Wildlife. She was awarded a \$500.00 VFGC Scholarship based on her well-written letter of intent combined with her many extracurricular activities and first semester grades of all A's and one B. We are hopeful that she will apply again next year.

The Botanist Daughter. Kayte Nunn. Orion, 2019.

An award winning historical novel is set in two times: 1800s Cornwall and 2017 Sydney, and centers around the search for a miracle plant that has the potential to save lives.

Woven into the plot are the lives of two women's stories.

The Garden of Small Beginnings. Abbi Waxman. Berkley, 2017.

A recently widowed mother of three and textbook illustrator finds herself in a botanical garden with the goal of learning more about plants and gardening in order to illustrate a book. Described as quirky and entertaining, the book also offers a bit of romance, gardening tips, and a cast of characters at an LA garden.

The Signature of All Things. Elizabeth Gilbert. Random, 2014.

From the author of Eat, Pray, Love, this is a globe-trotting novel of a 19th century woman botanist who searches for the origins of medicinal plants well before Darwin and her encounter and romance with historical figure Ambrose Pike, the remarkable illustrator of orchids.
